Delaware River in September 1705, survived by his wife, six sons (Bengt, Anders, Johan, Jacob, Daniel, and Joseph Bankson) and two daughters (Catharina and Brigitta).²⁷

Olof Stille (#7) from Roslagen, Sweden, came to New Sweden as a freeman in 1641 with his wife and two children, Ella (see #19) and Anders (#162). Olof had first settled at Techoherassi, between Crum Creek and Olle Stille's (later Ridley) Creek, with his brother Axel Stille and Måns Lom. The move to Moyamensing occurred in 1664. In 1671, Olof Stille was living with his youngest son, John Stille, born in 1646, who inherited his father's share of Moyamensing after Olof died c. 1684.²⁸

Lars Andersson Collinus (#8) came from Sweden in 1654 as a minister's scribe, married Måns Svensson Lom's widow, and took meticulous care of her nine children. By 1671 all had left home except sons Peter Månsson and Sven Månsson Lom and the youngest of seven daughters, Maria. Lars Andersson Collinus died in 1689.²⁹

Eric Pålsson Mullica (#9), of Finnish extraction, was the son of Pål Jönsson Mullica, a 1654 immigrant from Sweden. Eric was married and had two children, Anna and Anders, by 1671. His wife Ingeri, born in Värmland County, Sweden, c. 1646, came to America with her father, Olof Philipsson, in 1656. Probably living with the family in 1671 were Eric's brother Johan Mullica and Ingris's siblings Nils Olsson and Elisabeth, all of whom were then single. Eric Mullica had six subsequent children, Olof (b. 1673), Eric (b. 1675), Johan (b. 1677), Helena (b. 1680), Catharina (b. 1682), and Stephen (b. 1684). Soon after this census, Eric Mullica moved to Tacony. Later, he moved to Little Egg Harbor, New Jersey, where he died shortly after 1700 at his home by the river named after him (Mullica River). 30

Passyunk

The neighborhood as described by Wharton actually was two neighborhoods, Passyunk being on the east side of the Schuylkill in present
