128 JOHN HOUGH of Hough, Cheshire, his wife HANNAH and son JOHN, came on the Friendship, registering their arrival as in 9m 1683. PMHB, IX, 229. He was granted a warrant 21 9m 1683, for 125 acres to be laid out in Chester Co., but he settled in Middletown Twp., Bucks Co. Pennsylvania Archives, 3rd Series, III, 130; Bucks Court Records, 269, 375. He is not to be confused with the John Hough, brother of Richard, who came on the Endeavour. See PMHB, XVIII, 20n. Servants who came with the Houghs were George and Isabella Gleave (Glaire), both indentured for 4 years, and their son George, until he was 21. They eventually settled in Burlington Co. where Gleave was a wheelwright by trade. For notices of them, see N. J. Archives, XXI, 514; Burlington Court Book, 185, 176, 267, 269, 304. See also PGM, XXIII, 47n. Thomas Hough, another servant of John Hough, indentured for 4 years, was settled "above the Falls of Delaware" in Burlington Co. by 1699, for which see N. J. Archives, XXI, 518. The other Hough servant, NATHANIEL WATMOUGH (Wattmore), may have removed to Chester Co. after his indentures had expired; for possible reference to him see Chester Court Records, 298.
