Hello Cathy:

We are most surely related as Johan Jacob Hermanski was the father of my great grandfather Bernard Bartholomew Hermaski. My GGF Ben was a farmer near Kremlin (north of Enid, OK). I remember him best sitting in a rocking chair with a spittoon on the floor visiting with our family when I was 5 – 8 years old. Ben died in 1964 and his wife, Emma Fancher Hermanski came to live with her daughter/my grandmother, Mary Elizabeth Hermanski Collier. My grandmother Mary was a legal secretary who married my grandfather Eddie S Collier and moved to Taloga, Dewey County, Oklahoma. They had three children, the oldest was Shirley Lucille Collier (1932-1990), my mom, Roberta Pauline Collier Fahle (1935-living) and my uncle, Robert William Collier (1938-living). I have done AncrestryDNA testing and my GEDMatch kit is A542154. My Christmas present to myself this year is additional testing of my living uncle and mother – the first test kit was received by Ancestry on Monday this week.

We have a public tree "ODAYFAHLE" and our Ancestry user name is ODAYFAHLE. We welcome all friends and family and we'd love to see your family tree to add lost generations. My grandmother (Mary Elizabeth Hermanski Collier) spent a lot of time in the Enid area and my mom was best friends with her cousins children of Bernard Leroy Hermanski (grandson of Johan Jacob Hermanski) and wife Katherine. Bernard and Katherine lived less than ½ mile down the road from my GGPs. They too were farmers and their son Jimmy Hermanski continues to farm on the original homestead.

Are you searching on behalf of Chris Hermanski who shows up as a 3<sup>rd</sup> - 4<sup>th</sup> cousin?

My wife started the family genealogy project years ago to find where her ancestor's lived in Ireland (Thomas O'Day 1835-1894). Her family continues to farm in the same area as their ancestors in western lowa (residents since 1870). I can find Thomas O'Day and his wife, Margaret in Donegal Township, Washington County, Pennsylvania and in the 14<sup>th</sup> cavalry of the PA infantry during the civil war. I just can't determine which of a dozen Thomas O'Day's in the famine ship records might be the right one.

DNA testing has identified several IRE and AU relatives at 5-6 generations back; but, no luck so far tracking this line (one of seven Irish GGP lines). I'll say a prayer and hope that the next person who tests links us without doubt to someone.

I haven't dug deeply into the Hermanski family search – everything on my tree is from family bibles and family history. If I've learned anything during the past year, I know that family "stories" are often misinformation and the facts simply don't support the "story". Additional digging may help complete the family story – including buying another soldier's identity to leave Germany before one of the Franco-Prussian wars (if the stories are right)..

I pray for good health and happiness over this holiday season; please pass our best wishes to those searching for their ancestors.
