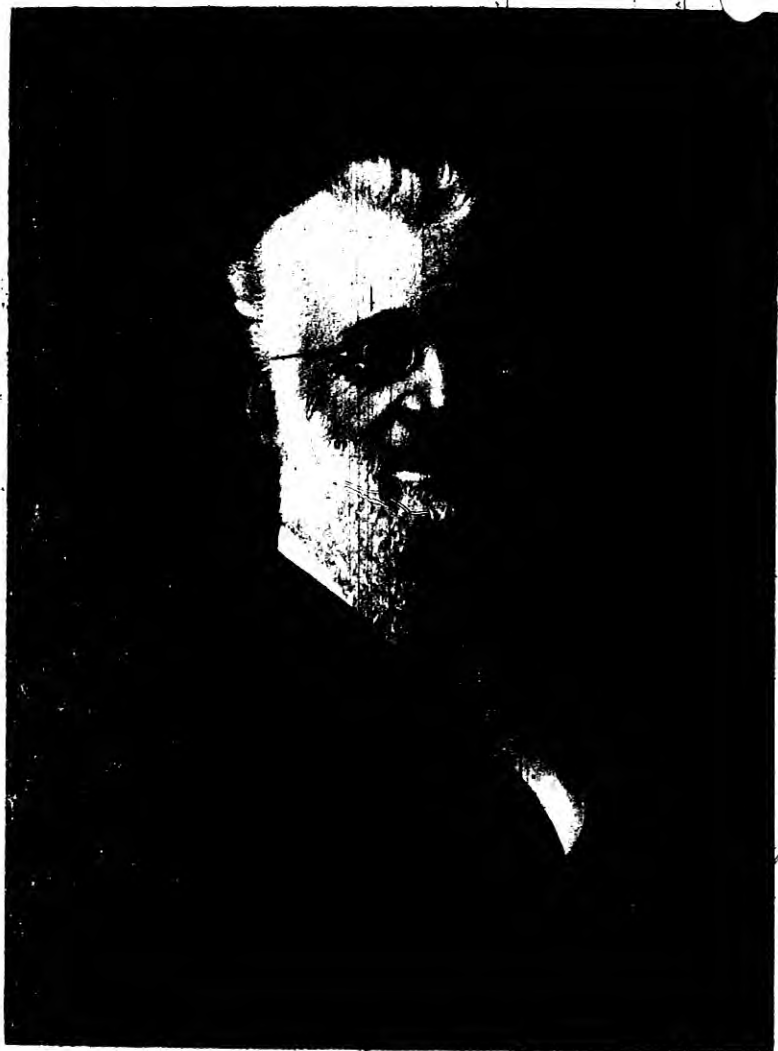

HENRY RUST AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

1 Henry, the progenitor of the family to which this work is devoted, came from Hingham, Norfolk county, England, 1633-35 and settled in Hingham, Mass., and was the first of the name to settle in America. The author has not been able to learn the exact date of his landing, nor the ship he came over in, but history informs us that he was at Hingham as early as June, 1635, as the following will prove:

"June 1635 Thomas Jason is to have two acres for a planting ground on Weary-All-Hill on the north side coming to the sea." [Daniel Fop joins Thomas Jason on the westward. John Farrah joins Fop on the westward.] "Henry Rust is to have two acres for planting ground next to John Farrah to the westward upon the same hill, be it more or less as it is measured." Then Thomas Lincoln has two acres joining Rust to the westward.

March 5, 1637. Henry Rust received his proportion from the town of meadow and upland of Nantascus Division: 39 recipients. "Henry Rust received one acre of meadow and five acres of upland." †

"March 23, 1637. These nine men hereafter mentioned being freemen of the town be chosen and deputed by the whole body of freemen to agitate and determine concerning any general business within the town except it be the making of any Rates, unless they be newly chosen in a legal way, or receiving in of any person to be an inhabitant into the town that is to say Edmont Hubbard, the older, Clement Bate, Nicholas Jacob, Henry Tuthill,

NOTE.—It appears that the new towns claimed title to the land wherever they settled and it was apportioned to whoever the selectmen or other proper authorities thought best: sometimes by lot, sometimes by selection by the authorities and sometimes by vote of the town, but it must be remembered that to constitute one a voter he must be a freeman, and to constitute him a freeman he must be a member of some Congregational church.

Henry Rust, Thomas Hammon, Anthony Eames, Samuel Ward and Thomas Underwood, and have full power put into their hands to agitate and to determine of all such business as shall concerne the town within the same — to give, *grant, let and set* all and every part or parcel of the same to the good of the whole; according to the best wisdom and skill for one whole year after the date hereof."

August 14, 1637. "Great lots" were given by the freemen as follows: "Henry Rust received 14 acres."

February 16, 1638. "Henry Rust with five others was chosen to make rates."

"The name of Henry Rust appears among the first settlers of Hingham about 1636. Henry Rust by jeynt consent have five acres to his house lot which he bought of George Russell next to Clement Bate on the east side and three acre* of planting ground upon Weary All Hill† which he bought with his house lot and next John Farrah; and three acres to a planting lot, upon the neck to the west of the ware. And two acres of marsh at Layford's Liking next to John Smart and is to have all these several parcels of land to be and to his heyeres for ever, be it more or less as it is measured."‡

As to his home in the old world, the following, from the N. E. Hist. and Gen. Register for April, 1876, is submitted as conclusive:

"On the 26 of April, 1638, the ship Dilligent, of Ipswich, England, of 350 tons burden, John Martin, Master, set sail from the mouth of the Thames for Massachusetts Bay having on board nineteen families and six or eight single persons, in all one hundred and thirty-three. Twelve of these families, numbering eighty-four souls, were from old Hingham, the rest from the immediate vicinity; and they had all embarked for the purpose of joining a colony settled in Hingham, Mass., 1633-37 (consisting of ten families and five single persons, in all forty-nine) who had been their friends and neighbors in old Hingham."

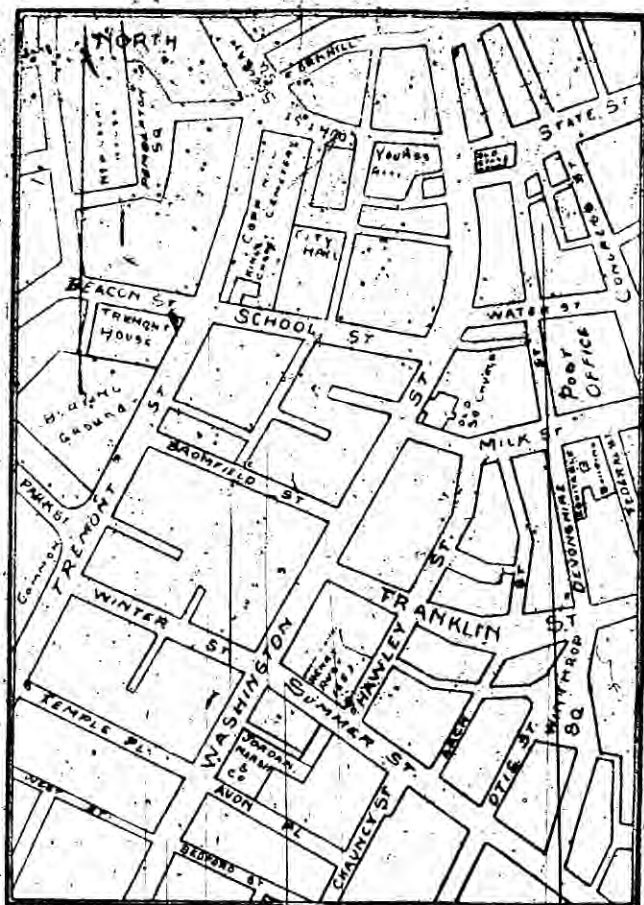

"The rector of the parish, Rev. Rob't Peck with his family consisting of wife, two children and two servants, also formed a part of the company." In same volume we learn that "The party having landed at Boston, Mass., Aug. 10, 1638, immediately proceeded to their place of destination about fourteen miles S. E. from Boston." From the above we deduce the facts that at the time of this accession the total population of Hingham was forty-nine and that Henry Rust must have been one of that number. We also learn that the first colonists at Hingham, among whom was Henry Rust, came from old Hingham, Norfolk county, England, or its "immediate vicinity."

In 1645 he was appointed for "ye recording births and burials in Hingham in the room of Mr. Peck;" but he must soon have removed to Boston as he was admitted to be an inhabitant of that place March 31, 1651.

Soon after becoming a citizen of Boston in 1651, Henry Rust purchased property there. The following is the deed of conveyance to him:

To all Christian People to whome this present Wrighting shall Come or may concerne, Awdrey Palmer of Boston in Newe England Widdowe sendeth greeting in our Lord God eurlasting Knowe yee that the said Awdrey Palmer for diuers good Causes & valluable Consideracions hir moueing, but more especially for & in Consideracoh of the some of Eigteene pounds of good & lawfull money of England to hir paid and by Obligacoh secured to be paid by Henry Rust of Boston in Newe England. Glouer Hath giuen graunted bargained sold alieneed enfeoffed & Confirmed And by this pfts doth giue graunt bargain sell aliene enfeoffe & confirme vnto the said Henry Rust his heires executo^r Administrato^r & assignes All that hir Cottage or Tent With the Garden or Orchard thereto belonging withall & singular hedges fences poulds payles Rayles Gates, Apletrees & fruit trees settuate lying & being to Boston aforesaid and now in the tenure or occupacoh of the said Awdrey Palmer or of hir assignes the ground of Nathaniell Woodward senior lying Northwest and the Highway East & South. That shee the said Awdrey Palmer her heires Executo^r administrato^r & assigns and ely of them shall & will at any tyme hereafter within Seauen yeres next ensueing the date hereof Seale & delit or cause to be sealed delitied & acknowledged all or any other deeds or deeds fines of request or recollie enroled or not enroled the enrolment of theis p'ts Release or Confirmacoff with warrantie against all p'son or p'sons. As by the Countell learned in the lawe he the said Henry Rust his heires executo^r administrato^r or assigns shallie reasonably deuised aduised or required So as the said Awdrey Palmer her heires executo^r administrato^r or assigns shall not bee compelled or compellable to traueile aboue seauen miles distant from the Towne of Boston for or about such further assureances. / And Lastly the Said Awdrey Palmer for her self her heires executo^r administrato^r & assigns and for ely of them doth Covenant promise & graunt to and wth the said Henry Rust his heires executo^r administrato^r & assigns That he the said Henry Rust his heires executo^r administrato^r & assigns shall or may quietly & peaceably haue hold vse occupie possesse & enjoy all and singuler the aboue bargained p'misses wth their & ely of their appurtenances to his & their owne proper vse for euer wthout the lett hindrance molestation contradiccion eueccion or p'ecchon of the said Awdrey Palmer her heires executo^r administrato^r or assigns or of John Palmer her sone his heires executo^r administrato^r or assigns or of any p'son or p'sons whatsoever lawfully haueing Claimeing or p'tending to haue any estate right title or interest of in or to the same or any p'te or p'cell thereof by from or vnder hir b^y them or any of them In Witnes whereof the said Awdrey Palmer hath here vnto interchangeably sett hir hand & Seale dated the El[]enth day of march in the yere of our Lord God One thousand [] hundred fiftie [] two

The following is a copy of conveyance of the same property from Henry Rust to his son Nathaniel Rust and his son-in-law Robert Earle.

To all Christian People to whom this present deed of Sale shall come Henry Rust of Boston within the county of Suffolk & Colony of the Massachusetts Bay in New England Glover sends greeting Know ye that I the said Henry Rust for divers good causes & valuable considerations Mee thereunto Moving more especially for & in consideration of the natural love good will & Affection which I have & bear unto my son Nathaniel Rust of Ipswich in New England aforesaid Glover & my Son in Law Robert Earle of Boston aforesaid Cordweiner husband to my daughter Hannah and for & Towards the repaiement & recompensing of them for their great love care dutifullness considerable charges & disbursements by them for severall yeares past expended in the releife & supplies of myself & wife (ssss) & in consideration of such farther charges & expenses as they or either of them shall further be at for my comfortable subsistence during my natural life & decent interment of my body after death, Have given granted bargained sold aliened onfeoffed & confirmed & by these present Do fully freely cleerly & absolutely give grant bargain sell alien onfeoffe & confirm unto them the said Nathaniel Rust & Robert Earle & to their heires & Assignes forever in equal halves all that my Messuage or Tenement Scituate lying & being at the southerly end of the towne of Boston above sd, wherein I now dwell with all the lands thereunto belonging as the same is now fenced in being buttred & bounded southerly by the street or highway y^e leadeth from the broadstreet along by sd Messuage or Tenement towards y^e water side, on the westerly side by the land of John Marlon

son^s part thereof was formerly y^e land of Benjamin Biscoe & at the Reer or northerly end by the land of Thomas Wybourn, & on the Easterly side by a certain lane there commonly called and knowne by the name of Bishops lane, Together with all houses edifices buildings & fences standing thereon, & all profits priviledges rights commodities, liberties Immunities & appurtenances whatsoever to the said Messuage or Tenem^t belonging or in any wise appertaining, or therewith now used occupied or enjoyed, with all deeds wrightings & evidences touching or concerning y^e same. And I do likewise hereby fully & absolutely give grant bargain sell & confirm unto the s^d Nathaniel Rust & Robert Earle in equal halves, All my goods household stuffe implements & utensills of household & moveable estate whatsoever as well remaining in the abovesaid messuage as in any other place, the principall things thereof being mentioned and contained in a schedule hereunto annexed.

To have & to hold the said Messuage or Tenement with all the land belonging to the same being buttred & bounded as aforesaid with all other y^e above granted premises and every part & parcel thereof unto the s^d Nathaniel Rust & Robert Earle their heires & Assignes forever in equal halves. To the only proper use benefit & behoof of them the s^d Nathaniel Rust & Robert Earle their heires and Assigns in equal halves for evermore, and I the said Henry Rust for me my heires Exec^r & Adm^r do hereby covenant promise and grant to & with the said Nathaniel Rust & Robert Earle their heires & Assignes in manner and forme following (that is to say that at the time of the enclosing & Delivery of these presents I am the true sole and lawful owner of all s^d Messuage or Tenement & appurtenances thereunto belonging & am lawfully seized of & in the same & every part thereof in my owne proper right of a true perfect & absolute Estate of Inheritance in fee simple without any manner of condition reversion or limitation whatsoever so as to alter charge defeat or make void the same And have in my self full power good right & Lawful authority to grant sell convey and Assure the s^d Messuage or Tenement with all other the above granted promise manner as

aforsaid. And that the s^d Nathaniel Rust & Robert Earle their heirs & Assignes in equal halves shal and may by force & virtue of these presents from time to time & at all times forever hereafter lawfully peaceably & quietly have hold use occupie possess & enjoy all the above granted premises with their appurtenances & every part & Parcel thereof, free & clear & clearly acquitted & discharged of & from all & all manner of former & other gifts grants bargains sales leases mortgages joyntures Dowers Judgments Executions entailes forfeitures & of and from all other titles troubles charges & incumbrances whatsoever had made committed done or suffered to be done by me the s^d Henry Rust my heires or Assignes at any time or times before the enscaling hereof. And the said Message or Tenement with all other the above granted premises with the appurtenances & every part thereof unto them the s^d Nathaniel Rust and Robert Earle their heirs & Assignes in equal halves against my self my heirs Exec^r & Adm^r & all & every other person & persons lawfully claiming any Right title or Interest therein shal & will warrant & for ever defend by these presents. And further whereas I have formerly given a double portion of my Estate unto my oldest son Samuel Rust dec'd I do by virtue of these presents utterly exclude and debar his wife & two children, namely Elizabeth Rust & Samuel Rust from having or claiming any right title or Interest of in & to the premises or any part thereof and likewise My son Israel Rust & his heirs. In witness whereof I the said Henry Rust have hereunto set my hand & seal this Twenty Eighth day of January ann^d Domⁱ one thousand six hundred eighty & foure Annop R^e Caroli Secundi nunc Anglid &c xxxv^j Henry Rust a Seale Signed Sealed & Delivered in presence of us after the words (& likewise my son Israel Rust & his heires) were first inter lined within, Likewise the within named Henry Rust reserves to himself during the term of his natural life the use benefit & priviledge of the two Low roomes & chambers over the same in the within mentioned Tenement wherein he now lives. John Earle Eliezer Moody. 3 Quiet & peaceable possession of all the movable estate as the same is mentioned & contained in this Deed was

given by the within named Henry Rust unto the within mentioned Robert Earle in behalf of himself & the within named Nathaniel Rust by the delivery & Receipt of one Pewter porringer Marked H^R in presence of the witnesses whose names are hereunto subscribed

The property purchased in 1653 by Henry Rust, of Awdrey Palmer, was subsequently, to wit: 25 April, 1728, made the site of Trinity Church as the following description of transfers will show. First deed: Awdrey Palmer to Henry Rust, 5 Aug., 1653. Description: "All that cottage or tenement with the garden or orchard thereto belonging withall and singular hedges," etc., etc. "The ground of Nathl Woodward, Sen., lying northwest

and the highway east and south."* Second deed: Henry Rust to Nathaniel Rust and Robert Earle, 28 Jan., 1684. Description: "Situate lying and being at the southerly end of the town of Boston as the same is now fenced in being butted and bounded southerly, by the street that leadeth from the Broad Street,† along by said messuage towards the waterside on the westerly by the land of John Marion at the rear or northerly end by land of Thomas Wylbourne and on the easterly side by a certain lane there commonly called and known by the name of Bishops Lane."‡ Third deed: Nathaniel Rust to Robert Earle Sept. 5, 1685, "one moiety or half part of all that messuage or tenement (wherein Henry Rust late of s'd Boston, deceased, dwelt)," description same as in deed, Henry Rust to Nathaniel Rust and Robert Earle. § Fourth deed: Robert Earle to Thomas Bannister 1 July, 1698. Description: "Lying and being at the southerly end of Boston, now in the possession of Robert Earle and Hannah Earle being known by the sign of the Seven Stars."|| Boundaries same as before given. Fifth deed: Thomas Bannister, by his brother Samuel, executor of the estate of Thomas and his wife, both dec'd, to Samuel Tyler 1720, lying and being in the southerly end of Boston bounded as followeth: Description: "Southerly upon Summer street measuring there eighty-six feet, easterly upon Bishops Lane, so called measuring there one hundred and sixty-nine feet, northerly on the land of John Valentine Esq. measuring there forty-five feet, westerly on land of heirs of John Marion dec'd measuring there on a straight line one hundred and twenty-nine feet and ten inches then bounded

northerly on land of the heirs of s'd Marion measuring there twenty-seven feet, then running northerly by the s'd Marion land till it comes to the said Valentines land measuring there 40 feet & six inches." Sixth deed: June 4, 1728, Samuel Tyler by Adm'r to William Speakman, same property.* Apr. 25, 1728, "Land was at this time purchased of William Speakman at the corner of Summer St. and Bishops Alley, now Hawley St., by Leonard Vassal, John Barnes, and John Gibbens apothecary" who were "with all convenient speed immediately to erect a church on it, to be contrived in a manner most conducing to the decent and regular performance of divine service, according to rubrick of the common prayer book, used by the church of England as by law established."† The corner stone of the Trinity church was laid Apr. 15, 1734.‡ Curiously enough, Trinity Church occupies the site of the old Pleiades or Seven Star Inn from which Summer street took its ancient name of Seven Star Lane. There was another sign of the same name, displayed by William Whitwell, a tradesman, near the drawbridge, in 1768.‡ When, in 1889, the author visited the early home of his ancestors he visited the identical property above described in Boston and it is the S. E. corner of Summer and Hawley streets, or, more accurately, it is the south corner of the block surrounded by Washington, Summer, Hawley and Franklin streets, directly opposite Jordan, Marsh & Co. on Summer St. A four-story stone block now occupies the corner, the interior of which was burned out in June, 1889. The ground floor, previous to the fire, was occupied by C. A. Browning & Co., as a millinery store and the three floors above were occupied by the Hoyer Bros. for all kinds of fireworks, etc. This property named above is only about one-quarter of the property sold to Henry Rust by Awdrey Palmer. That part of the property occupied by

this building, sold the last week in Aug., 1889 to a widow Pickett for \$350,000 or \$67 per square foot.

It is quite clear that the first property owned by Henry Rust in Boston was that subsequently known as the "Seven Star Inn" property, and it is quite reasonable to suppose that the name was adopted by him as a sign for his business, to wit: that of "Glover." If this sign was not adopted by Henry Rust it certainly must have been by his son-in-law, Robert Earle, as he called it by that name when he sold it in 1698.

In 1677 Henry Rust was a deponent in Boston.

We find no date of his death, but he must have deceased between January, 1684, the date of the instrument conveying his property and 1685, the date of the conveyance of the same property by Nathaniel Rust to Robert Earle, as Nathaniel refers to his father as "Henry Rust late of s'd Boston dec'd."

The name of his wife nowhere appears, hence we are left to speculate as to the name of our maternal emigrant ancestor. We have no knowledge of there being but one daughter, to wit: Hannah, and we may infer that the mother's name was the same as that of her only daughter. We are also left in the dark as to the date of her death and find but two allusions to her. It is recorded on the books of the First Church, Boston, "Henry Rust & wife admitted to the church 20 of y^r, 12 mo 1669," again in Henry Rust's deed of conveyance to Nathaniel Rust and Robert Earle he refers to "my wife." We are quite as much in the dark as to whether our ancestor married in England or America, but probably the latter, as he was in America as early as June, 1635, and perhaps earlier, and their first child, whose birth is recorded, was born in August 1638.

From the three sons of this Henry Rust, Samuel, Nathaniel and Israel, has this entire family sprung. Samuel settled in Boston, Nathaniel in Ipswich and Israel in Northampton.

The following are the credits given under Major Savage, whose company in this campaign, (Phillip's War), from February, 1675-76, to May, was under the immediate command of Lieut. Gillam. 24 June, 1676, Samuel Rust, £02 02s 00d* credited under Capt. Thomas Lathrup; 9 Nov., 1675, Samuel Rust, £02 08s 00d.† Credited under Samuel Appleton, 10 Dec., 1675, Samuel Rust £04 00s 00d.‡ In a memorial, 15 April, 1676, "Samuel Rust sets forth that he has been in King Phillip's War under Capt. Sill for nine months and asks for his wages, said he had a wife and family." §

We have no record of the death of Samuel, but he must have died between April 15, 1676, the date of his memorial, and, 1684, the date of the conveyance of his father, Henry Rust, as in the conveyance he is referred to as deceased. Samuel's wife was alive in January, 1684, as appears by the deed, Henry Rust to his son, Nathaniel, and Robert Earle.

This conclusion was based upon the idea that Abraham Perkins, (a son of Quarter Master John), who receipted for money in the settlement of the estate of Nathaniel Rust, was a brother to Nathaniel's wife, Mary, because on one side of that receipt he calls Nathaniel "Brother Rust." With the cause that moved Abraham Perkins to call Nathaniel Rust "Brother Rust?" we have nothing to do. The Wardell will settles the question of parentage of Nathaniel's wife, Mary.

life, where he remained until his death, 23 Dec., 1713. He was in Ipswich as early as 1661 and engaged in the manufacture of gloves by which vocation he earned the title of "Nathaniel the Glover" and was so called, probably, to designate him in later years from his son, Nathaniel.

"In 1674 Nathaniel Rust and Samuel Hunt are permitted to set up a wear about the Falls (in Ipswich) if it do not hinder the mill nor the passage thereto."

"Dec. 10.—As Major Samuel Ward & the rest of the officers belonging to Mr. Rust's company are absent, he is to grant certificates to the soldiers of this company."

Henry P. Waters' collection of Rust genealogy has the following:

"In probate records Nathaniel Rust's name appears as appraiser of estates of Thomas Andrews (1683), Jona. Wade (1683), Abraham Fitts (1692), Joseph Fellows (1693), Robert Lord, Sen'r (1683), Thomas Fellows (1689), Serg't. Tho's. Clarke, Sen'r., (1689), John Day (1689), Anthony Potter (1689), Samuel Pearce (1691), John Hodgkins (1690), appointed overseer by Anthony Potter (1689); and in account with estates of Cornelius Kelt (1673), John Emery, Sen'r. of Newbury (1683), John Wood (1685), Capt. Moses Bradstreet (1691), Fennel Resse (1683), Edward Hazen of Rowley (1683), John Poor, Sen'r. (1685), John Knowlton (1684), Thomas Bellows (1691), Thomas Abbott of Andover (1695), John King (1684); he deposes in 1689 as witness to William Wood's will; "ho't a new flock bed" for Theophilus Wilson before 1690; and in 1693, (Oct. 13), Mr. Nathaniel Rust, Sen'r. and Mr. John Whipple were commissioners to receive claims against the estate of Peter Berry dec'd, (insolvent)."

By a bond of Capt. Rindge and Deacon Norton, on file with their administrators' bond, but not recorded and now hardly legible, it appears that he had conveyed his real estate to them for the "support and comfortable maintenance of himself and his wife in their old age and under infirmities etc." The date of the acknowledgment of their bond was 9 May, 1710-11. The account of administration was presented 11 May, 1719,

when the inventory had increased to £175 18s 8d, accompanying this is an account drawn off by Capt. Rindge from his books, (not recorded), Jan. 6, 1713-14. This account begins with the last adjustment, 26 July, 1701, and the last entry is as follows: "9 Dec. (1711) to sundries for funeral charge, As gloves, mourning cloth for the wido wine, sugar, Digin ye grave pai in the Doctor & paying ye nurs all 8£ 02s 06d." His wife died 1720, "she age 78 years."

The General Court records are as follows: "In pursuance of the order of the General Court, 16 Oct., 1679, about those that are behind what they subscribed to the new building for the College at Cambridge, have appointed Nathaniel Rust to demand the same of such as live on the south side of the river." We also find the following upon the records: "1680 Feb 7 Simon Stace and Nathaniel Rust brought in an account of nineteen pounds, fifteen shillings in corn and malt, put aboard John Dutch his sloop and brought a receipt under the hand of Mr. John Woodmancie, who was to receive it by order of Mr. William Manning of Cambridge, of seventy-eight bushells and a half of indian corn, and thirty bushells and three pecks of malt, and this was in April the 20 1680."

On the funeral occasion of Mr. Cobbets, we find the following recorded: "That Mr. Rust provide if he can against the funeral, Gloves suitable for men and women to the value of five or six pounds, not money pay, and some spice and ginger for the Syder."

In the itemized account of the expense of this funeral was the following:

"It. To Mr. Nathaniel Rust money layd out for funeral £2 04s 00d".

"It. For said Rust going to Salem 4s 00d."

"Sept ye 1st 1692, Nathaniel Rust sen. with others was appointed, on a committee to oversee affairs necessary for ye ordination of Mr. John Rogers."

Note.—It must be remembered that this Rust was the "Glover" and therefore he had the contract to furnish the gloves on this occasion, but not to receive pay in cash, but as Cambridge College was paid for, in corn, malt, etc., or some other articles or commodities. It will also be noticed that "Syder" was a necessity on funeral occasions and provisions were also made for spice and ginger in the "Syder."

"March 23 1692-3 Mr. Nathaniel Rust was appointed one of the selectmen to lay out more town", and we find that William Willson sold his lot "with ye rocks thereon" to Mr. Nathaniel Rust, Sen.*

Nathaniel the "Glover" took the freeman's oath 27 May, 1674, and was appointed quartermaster in the expedition to Canada, 19 June, 1690, and was representative to the legislature in 1690 and 1691. Mr. Nathaniel Rust, Sen., of Ipswich, "Glover," died intestate and his sons-in-law, Capt. Daniel Ringe and Mr. Thomas Norton, were appointed administrators of his estate, 23 Dec., 1713. Amount, £100 17s 2d, all personal estate.† Account of Daniel Rindge and Thomas Norton, the administrators, presented 11 May, 1719. Nothing left after £10 was allowed to the widow.‡
