The petitioner took said horse to the house and the woman of the house declared in the presence of Mr. Bingaman that she knew the horse to belong to Charbonneau, having seen him frequently in his possession. Petitioner asked her who had sold the horse to Mr. Charbonneau for he had purchased the said horse from Don Carlos de Grand-Pre for \$35 as can be proved by creditable witnesses and which ad never sold to Charbonneau nor to any other person, the petitioner having refused Don Estevan Minor who offered him \$40 for same. 8 March 1783.

NELSON. Peter Nelson and his wife, Margaret, formerly the widow of Henry Lasleur, both made their wills on 19 Dec. 1812. These wills were very nearly the same, except for one item in which Peter Nelson willed to his wife, Margaret, one-half of his whole estate, real and personal. The other half he willed to their three children, Marson, Peter, Jr., and Catherine. Whereas Margaret left to their three children all of her estate except \$5.00 to each of her five daughters by her first marriage, to whom Peter Nelson had also left the same amount. They had apparently received the property due to them from their father's estate. Peter Nelson's will was probated Apr. 8, 1817; Margaret Nelson's at the 1 Term of Court, 1620. A lawsuit in 1830 indicates that Magdeline Lasleur m. Austin Holbrook, Margaret m. Lewis Sharberson, Mary m. John Craven, Ann m. James Tyler and Sarah m. James Clark. (Hen. 91, 330,332.)
