Sir:

The evidence in support of your claim, under the act of June 7, 1832, has been examined, and the papers are herewith returned. The following is a statement of your case in a tabular form. On comparing these papers with the following rules and the subjoined notes, you will readily perceive that objections exist, which must be removed, before a pension can be allowed. The notes and the regulations will shew what is necessary to be done. These points to which your attention is more particularly directed, you will find marked in the margin with a brace, (thus: {). You will, when you return your papers to this Department, send this printed letter with them; and you will, by complying with this request, greatly facilitate the investigation of your claim.

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Before me the undersigned Justice of the Peace within and for said County of Trumbull personally appeared Simon Wheeler of Brookfield in the County aforesaid age Seventy two years who being duly sworn deposes and saith that he was intimately acquainted with Joel Hanson late of Vienna in said County of Trumbull deceased in his life time from the time the said Joel was fifteen years of age until his death and for the whole of that period the defendant lived within a Mile of the said Joel Hanson as well when living in the State of Connecticut as after his removal to the State of Ohio - This defendant was known to the said Joel Hanson entering the service of his Country as a private Soldier in the year 1775 under our Captain Leavenworth - He then march to Boston Massachusetts and served as this defendant surely believes in that town Nine Months. Said Joel Hanson was living at Woodbridge in New Haven County Connecticut when he entered the service as a private - In the year 1776 the said Joel Hanson was drafted in the Militia and marched to New York - This defendant believes he the said Joel served at this time three months and under Captain David Brasher -

This defendant knows that the said Joel Hanson was drafted several other times in addition to the foregoing and served out the time for which he was drafted our under Captain Sprague - This defendant served one term in the same company with the said Joel Hanson at New Haven under Cap. Sprague.

The said defendant surely believes this said Joel Hanson served at least three years as a private during the Revolutionary War - The said Joel Hanson moved from Connecticut to Vienna Trumbull County Ohio in the year 1803 - He died in said Vienna on the 21st day of July A.D. 1832 and was then as I then perfectly seven years of age - His widow Anna Hanson is my sister and is forty four years of age - She was married to the said Joel Hanson at Woodbridge

in the State of Connecticut in the month of June in the
year 1776. He died with the said fool in Vienna to
the time of his death and still resides in the same place

The State of Ohio On the 22^d day of May A.D. 1859 personally
 Trumbull County & appeared in open Court before the Board
 of Common Pleas now sitting at Warren
 within and for said County of Trumbull, Anna Thompson
 a resident of Vienna Township in said County of Trumbull
 aged Seventy six years and known to the Court as the widow
 of Joel Thompson late of said Vienna deceased, who being
 first duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make
 the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of
 the act of Congress passed June 7, 1832 in Consequence of the
 Military Services of her late husband, the said Joel Thompson,
 rendered his Country during the American Revolutionary
 War: That the said Joel Thompson entered the Service of
 the United States under the following named Officer and
 Dated as herein stated - The said Joel Thompson enlisted
 at New Haven in the County of New Haven and State of Connecticut
 on the 8th day of September A.D. 1776 as appears from a
 Record of his birth in a family Bible now in her possession.
 Some years previous to the Commencement of the War the
 Father of said Joel Thompson removed with his family
 to Woodbridge in the said County of New Haven & State
 of Connecticut - Early in the year 1775 the said Joel Thomp-
 son enlisted for six months at Woodbridge and served in that
 in a Company of Connecticut Troops raised in that
 neighborhood and commanded by one Captain Leavens-
 worth - I recollect this term of Service well because we
 were then engaged to be married to each other and I also
 kind at that time in the same Town of Woodbridge.
 He was marched off with the Company under Captain
 Leavens worth to Boston in Massachusetts where they took
 from the County around two thousand people - He
 served as a private and served out his six months
 when he returned home. I do not know whether he
 ever had a written discharge - On the following 16th
 day of June in the year 1776 we were married at the same
 Woodbridge - Soon after our marriage, and the same
 summer said Joel Thompson was drafted for a
six months term in a Company of Militia under
 Captain David Beekler - He was marched to New
 York where he served out the six months as a
 private in the Army when he was again discharged
 It was afterwards, but at what period of the war -
 cannot now say drafted to go to New England at

which place he served as a private Two Months - Then
 during the war he was drafted to go to New Haven and
 served at that place as a private One Month at each
 time he was then drafted - He went and once under a
 Captain Brown and at another time under Captain Crow
 Sperry of Woodbridge - He served in all according to
 the best of my recollection eighteen months and always
 as I understand as a Private - After the war was ended
 we moved to Farmington in Connecticut from which
 place we removed in the year 1813 to Vienna in Franklin
 County (Ohio) where we lived until the death of my
 husband, the said Joel Hennass, which took place on
 the 8th day of July A.D. 1832; and when I now reside -
 I have no documentary evidence of my husband's services
 but Mr. Union Wheeler a neighbor and himself a soldier
 of the Revolution can testify as to some part of his service -
 I cannot without much inconvenience obtain
 the Certificate of a Clergyman but all my neighbors
 are ready to certify with respect to the age of my
 husband at the time of his decease and touching the
 belief - I might hazard as to his Revolutionary services
 and among them are Thomas Lewis of West Vienna and
 Christopher Smith - I hereby relinquish any claim what-
 ever a pension or annuity or account of the Revolutionary
 services of the said Joel Hennass and except the present
 claim for a pension from the taking effect of the act of
 Congress passed June 7. 1832 up to the time of the death of the
 said Joel on the 8th day of July 1832 - and declare that
 his name is not at his request on the pension roll
 of the agency of my State -

I have to and do subscribe the day Ann Hennass
 and year aforesaid 1832

The State of Ohio is, At a Court of Probate begun and
Summit County held at the Probate Judges Office
in the County of Summit and

State of Ohio, on the 27th day of January
1853. Present Mr & Mrs Probate Judge holding said
Court.

This day personally appeared Anna C. Shaff
in Open Court and having been duly sworn to say
that she following is a true copy of what purports to
be the family record of the late Joel Cumason whom
Cumason his wife recorded in other Recessional Bill
which is now before him.

Joel and Anna Cumason was born Sept the
8th 1756

Joel Cumason and Anna Shaffler was married
on the 16th day of June 1776.

Joel Cumason departed this life on the 8th day
of July 1832, aged 76 years.

Anna Cumason departed this life March 15th
1838 and 82 years.

While record her true has been retained in
the family of Isaac Cumason one of the children
of the aforesaid Joel Cumason and Anna Cumason.
Since the death of the said Anna Cumason
in the family where he died up to this date,
and further that he was personally acquainted
with Anna Cumason before he died and that
he has seen the said Anna Cumason's record
kept in the said Anna Cumason's possession I used by
her before her death, and that he believes that the
said record is correct that the said Joel Cumason
& Anna Cumason were legally married on the
16th day of June 1776 and that they lived together
as man and wife up to the time of the said
Joel Cumasons death which took place July 8 1832

and that the said Mrs. Remond deceased
late of Kenya in the County of Greenwich and
State of New York was the widow of the said John
Remond a Revolutionary Soldier of the United
States and that John Remond died in Remond
in the County and State aforesaid on the 13th
the tenth day of March 1838 leaving the
following her only surviving children to wit,
Eliza Remond and John Remond who still
reside in the township of Remond County and
State aforesaid.

It is therefore ordered by the Court that the Pro
bate facts be certified to the Commissioner of
Probate at Washington to make the said John
Remond & John Remond to obtain the assets
of Remond due his mother the said Mrs.
Remond at her decease.

Dear Madam:

You are advised that it appears from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W.4244, that Joel Hammson was born September 8, 1756, at New Haven, New Haven County, Connecticut, and some years before the beginning of the Revolutionary War, moved with his father and family to Woodbridge, New Haven County, Connecticut. The names of his parents are not given.

While residing at Woodbridge, Connecticut, he enlisted early in 1775, and served nine months as a private in Captain Leavenworth's Connecticut Company.

He enlisted in the summer of 1776 or in 1777, and served five months as a private in Captain David Beacher's Connecticut Company.

He served two months at New London, dates and officers names not given, and two tours of one month each at New Haven under Captains Brown and Ezra Sperry, dates not given.

After the Revolution, he moved to Farmington, Connecticut and in 1803, to Vienna, Trumbull County, Ohio.

He died July 8, 1832, in Vienna, Ohio.

The soldier married June 16, 1776, at Woodbridge, Connecticut, Ann Wheeler. Both were then of said Woodbridge.

Soldier's widow, Ann, was allowed pension on her application executed May 22, 1833, at which time she was aged seventy-six years and resided in Vienna Township, Ohio.

She died March 13, 1838, in Vienna, Ohio.

In 1853, the only surviving children of Joel and Ann Humason were two sons, Isaac and Joel J. Humason, both residing at that time in Vienna Township, Ohio. The names of no other children appear.
