

## Pierce Line - Chart 10

**Sargent Thomas Pierce**, born Abt. 1620 in England; died 06 Nov 1683 in Woburn, Middlesex County, Massachusetts (Source: Woburn, Massachusetts Vital Records.). He was the son of **3792. Thomas Pierce** and **3793. Elizabeth Carew**. He married **1897. Elizabeth Cole** 06 May 1635 in Charleston, Massachusetts.

**Elizabeth Cole**, born Abt. 1621 in England; died 05 Mar 1687/88 in Woburn, Middlesex County, Massachusetts (Source: Woburn, Massachusetts Vital Records.). She was the daughter of **3794. Rice Cole** and **3795. Arrald Unknown**.

THOMAS PIERCE: admitted into Charlestown Church February 21, 1634/5. (Charlestown Ch. Rec.). Was in Woburn as early as 1643; was taxed there, 1645; is often styled in the Records there, "Sargent Thomas Peirce; was Selectman of Woburn, 1660, and repeatedly afterwards; of the committee for dividing the common land in Woburn among "the right proprietors," chosen March 28, 1667; and also of the General Court's committee appointed for the same purpose in 1668.

WORNBURN RECORDS: Nov 9, 1643: At a public town meeting by consent of the town, it was ordered, that if any man shall absent himself from a public meeting, without a lawful excuse, he shall pay 18 pence to the use of the town. At the same time John Tidd and Thomas Pierce were chosen to look that the fences be sufficient.

Notes for Thomas Pierce:

THOMAS PIERCE, FOURTH, son of Thomas (3) and his first wife, Elizabeth, was born in Woburn February 27, 1671 and married there in 1692/3 Mary Wyman (born June 25, 1674, daughter of John, Junior, and

Mary (Carter) Wyman). With his brother Timothy he removed to Connecticut. (For conditions in the Quinebaug district there, at this time, see SHEPARD.) Thomas (4) died in Plainfield, Conn. in 1706, "the first married man to die in the town." Inventory of his estate was presented by his widow November 28, 1706. Distribution was recorded nearly eight years later, October 12, 1714. His widow was then the wife of John Hutchins. The surviving children (Elizabeth and John had died young) are named in order of birth, otherwise the list is the same as in their grandfather's will three years later. They were Mary, Thomas, Ebenezer, Amos and Rachel. Their mother, Mary (Wyman) (Pierce) Hutchins, died in Killingly, Conn. February 15, 1738/9. "

Notes for Mary Wyman:

She "MARY WYMAN, daughter of John, Junior, and Mary (Carter) Wyman, was born in Woburn June 25, 1674 and was barely a year-and-a-half old when her father was killed. She married in 1692/3, Thomas (4) Pierce (born February 27, 1671, son of Thomas (3) and Elizabeth Pierce). (See Pierce)

### Amos Pierce<sup>1</sup>

Amos **Pierce** was born on 3 August 1702 at Plainfield, Windham Co., CT.<sup>1,3</sup> He was the son of **Thomas Pierce** and **Mary Wyman**.<sup>2,3</sup> Amos Pierce married **Mary Spaulding** circa 1726.<sup>1</sup> Amos Pierce married **Widow Pyer** after 1768.<sup>1</sup> Amos Pierce died in 1791 at Windham Co., CT.<sup>1</sup>

Blackman and Allied Families, p. 55, regarding Robert Campbell (10:4):

"He married Apr. 13, 1727, Mary McMains (Voluntown Vital Records, I-II), daughter of Daniel and (Jannet?) McMains. Mary Campbell died July 29, 1763, and Rev. Robert Campbell married (2) Hannah Spaulding, who was born Nov. 6, 1712 (Bible Records, Robert Campbell Genealogy, p. 50)

'Aug 2, 1731. Robert Campbell of Voluntown, Conn., to honored father (in-law) Daniel Macmains of Lancaster in the County of Middlesex, Mass., quit claimed right to land in Voluntown that I had of sd honored father Daniel Macmains which he bought of John Campbell of sd Voluntown, a right originally Richard Lord's. (Voluntown, Conn., Land Records, 4A-524.)'

'Rev. Robert Campbell was called to the pastorate of the Congregational Church, Canaan, Conn., Jan. 13, 1761, and was ordained and installed Oct. 20, 1761. "In April, 1762, the church held a fast to know their duty about removing to Stillwater, Albany County (Now Saratoga County, N.Y. which place was designated as desirable for settlement by a committee sent out to investigate. The greater part of the members removed with their pastor." (Robert Campbell Genealogy, p. 51.) The removal of the church took place in 1762. The Rev. Robert Campbell lived in Stillwater until his death, which took place, according to his gravestone, Feb. 19, 1789, in the 80th year of his age. (Ibid., p. 55)
